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what motivates people to dress in a manner that marks them out as different to the conventional norm is it true that with dress anything goes in our mix and match postmodern culture have easily recognizable authentic subcultures imploded in a glut of ironic revivals and stylistic fragmentation does this supposed post subcultural generation actively celebrate ephemerality transience and disposability merely casting off and trying on one alternative identity after another in an ever accelerating fashion frenzy this exciting book is a considered sociological examination of such questions by listening to the voices of the subcultural stylists themselves their subjective perceptions of their style and the ideas that lie behind them the author provides original insights into issues of subjectivity and identity situating an empirical case study within a wider consideration of postmodernism and cultural change the author rejects cultural studies perspectives that attempt to read subcultures as texts drawing on extensive interviews with people who dress in what might be deemed a stylistically unconventional manner he seeks instead to establish whether contemporary subcultures display modern or postmodern sensibilities and forms he argues persuasively that they do both

a stress on postmodern hyperindividualism fluidity and fragmentation runs alongside a modernist emphasis on authenticity and underlying essence he concludes that a romantic libertarianism has permeated working class culture and that the distinction between individualistic middle class countercultures and collectivist working class subcultures has been over emphasized

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the chapters in this reader are grouped into thematic sections each with a comprehensive introduction by ken gelder there is also a new general introduction that traces the historical development and key concerns of subcultural studies

subcultures is delightful reading for those who are interested in groups at the fringes of society such as dead heads members of the lgbtq culture gamers and even subcultural elements of some alt right groups

the author critically examines the assumptions underlying drug prohibition and explores the contradictions of drug prevention policies

in a global society with a rapid proliferation of images fashions and lifestyles it is becoming increasingly difficult to pinpoint what subculture actually means this work states that it may be a convenient way to describe more unconventional aspects of youth culture

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have always attracted a lot of attention both from the media and from academics it is not surprising because members of youth subcultures tend to be highly visible and often are responsible for moral panics secondly youth cultures have been considered to be the product or epitome of social change or a barometer of future changes that is why in the twentieth century in the time of social economic and political changes youth became an object of sociological cultural and psychological analyses the concept of subculture has been an attractive model for explanation and analysis of youths individual and collective behaviours in sociology for a diversity of theoretical positions it is noticeable that every successive paradigm has tried to criticize or to show its dominance and authority over previous understandings the term subculture was initially used in 1950 s in the works of the chicago school in the us to refer to the urban gangs in british subcultural theory has begun with the studies of sociologists who sought to explain delinquent behaviour of young people and consistently relied on psychology and psychoanalysis but the most influential body of work is new subcultural theory that was created during the 1970 s by the researchers from the centre for contemporary cultural studies cccs at birmingham university it has been strongly criticized but is still considered to be the ground work on subcultures however according to rupa huq the term subculture has in many ways come of age there are a lot of academics that criticize the writings of the cccs and have developed postmodern theories on subcultures they suggest new definitions and explanations of subcultures or even claim that the notion of subculture cannot be applied anymore to describe the culture of today s youth in this paper i will introduce some different strands of the subculture theory about youth during the twentieth century i will briefly introduce the theory of delinquency of american and british sociologists and then i will give an overview of the cultural studies approach from the university of birmingham in the 1970 s and briefly indicate its weaknesses then i will introduce the approach of the contemporary subcultural theory and explain the concepts of clubculture neo tribe and lifestyle which are considered to be alternative to the concept of subculture

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
